Akrotiri

One of the most impressive archaeological sites worldwide. The prehistoric town of Akrotiri is often compared to Pompeii, although it is about 1,700 years older. It was buried, after the volcanic eruption of 1613 BC, under tons of ash and remained buried for nearly 3,500 years.
